## **Opening Address**

## The First Reading is written in the book of Acts, chapter 2, verses 42 to 47.

<sup>42</sup> And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. <sup>43</sup> And awe<sup>[a]</sup> came upon every soul, and many wonders and signs were being done through the apostles. <sup>44</sup> And all who believed were together and had all things in common. <sup>45</sup> And they were selling their possessions and belongings and distributing the proceeds to all, as any had need. <sup>46</sup> And day by day, attending the temple together and breaking bread in their homes, they received their food with glad and generous hearts, <sup>47</sup> praising God and having favor with all the people. And the Lord added to their number day by day those who were being saved.

## The Epistle Reading is from St. Peter's first letter, chapter 2, verses 19 to 25.

<sup>19</sup> For this is a gracious thing, when, mindful of God, one endures sorrows while suffering unjustly. <sup>20</sup> For what credit is it if, when you sin and are beaten for it, you endure? But if when you do good and suffer for it you endure, this is a gracious thing in the sight of God. <sup>21</sup> For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you might follow in his steps. <sup>22</sup> He committed no sin, neither was deceit found in his mouth. <sup>23</sup> When he was reviled, he did not revile in return; when he suffered, he did not threaten, but continued entrusting himself to him who judges justly. <sup>24</sup> He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. # The Holy Gospel is according to St. John, chapter 21.

After this Jesus revealed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias, and he revealed himself in this way. <sup>2</sup> Simon Peter, Thomas (called the Twin), Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples were together. <sup>3</sup> Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We will go with you." They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing. <sup>4</sup> Just as day was breaking, Jesus stood on the shore; yet the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. <sup>5</sup> Jesus said to them, "Children, do you have any fish?" They answered him, "No." <sup>6</sup> He said to them, "Cast the net on the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in, because of the quantity of fish. <sup>7</sup> That disciple whom Jesus loved therefore said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on his outer garment, for he was stripped for work, and

threw himself into the sea. <sup>8</sup> The other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, but about a hundred yards off.

<sup>9</sup>When they got out on land, they saw a charcoal fire in place, with fish laid out on it, and bread. <sup>10</sup>Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." <sup>11</sup>So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, 153 of them. And although there were so many, the net was not torn. <sup>12</sup>Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." Now none of the disciples dared ask him, "Who are you?" They knew it was the Lord. <sup>13</sup>Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and so with the fish. <sup>14</sup>This was now the third time that Jesus was revealed to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.

<sup>15</sup> When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." He said to him, "Feed my lambs." <sup>16</sup> He said to him a second time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." He said to him, "Tend my sheep." <sup>17</sup> He said to him the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter was grieved because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" and he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. <sup>18</sup> Truly, truly, I say to you, when you were young, you used to dress yourself and walk wherever you wanted, but when you are old, you will stretch out your hands, and another will dress you and carry you where you do not want to go." <sup>19</sup> (This he said to show by what kind of death he was to glorify God.) And after saying this he said to him, "Follow me." <sup>20</sup> Peter turned and saw the disciple whom Jesus loved following them, the one who also had leaned back against him during the supper and had said, "Lord, who is it that is going to betray you?"<sup>21</sup> When Peter saw him, he said to Jesus, "Lord, what about this man?"<sup>22</sup> Jesus said to him, "If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you? You follow me!"<sup>23</sup> So the saying spread abroad among the brothers<sup>[b]</sup> that this disciple was not to die; yet Jesus did not say to him that he was not to die, but, "If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you?"

<sup>24</sup> This is the disciple who is bearing witness about these things, and who has written these things, and we know that his testimony is true. <sup>25</sup> Now there are also many other things that Jesus did. Were every one of them to be written, I suppose that the world itself could not contain the books that would be written.

**Apostles' Creed:** I believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth. And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried. He descended into hell. 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#### The Sermon:

I wish that I could be known for something else. John is known as being the disciple whom Jesus loved. Paul is known for being the persecutor who became the Church's greatest missionary. James is known for being the leader of the Jerusalem church and for being the brother of Jesus. Stephen is known for being the first martyr.

And do you know what I am known for? I am known as the guy who is rash and impulsive. I am known as the guy who acts before he thinks. I am known as the guy who needs to have things told to him three times for him to understand it. But, this reputation and claim to

fame is okay with me. For in a way, I am just like you. I represent all believers and many people have learned from my mistakes and examples. Perhaps the most famous incident of this happened on that one morning by the Sea of Tiberias.

It had been at least two weeks since Jesus had died and had risen from the dead, and I was with some of his disciples by the Sea of Tiberias. I believe the disciples were Thomas, Nathanael, James, John, and I can't remember the two others, but that doesn't matter. I decided to go fishing and they said that they would go with me. So we went in the boat and caught nothing that whole night.

At about the crack of dawn, we see some man on the shore who yells out, "Children, do you have any fish?" and we responded, "No." He then told us to "Cast the net on the right side of the boat, and you will find some." We figured, why not? What we were doing was not working anyways. How could this crazy suggestion hurt, we figured. So we threw the net on the right side of the boat and our net immediately becomes full of fish.

As this is going on, John realizes who the man is and tells me, "It is the Lord!" When I heard this, I grabbed my outer garment since I was just in my undergarments, and I impulsively jumped in the water and swam to shore. What a surprise knowing me, right?

So the others bring the net full of fish to shore and we find a fire with a meal prepared for us by Jesus. Jesus told us, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." We did and found out that we caught 153 fish. I was amazed that the net didn't break. Normally it does with a catch that size. And then Jesus began to serve us breakfast. This was the third time that Jesus had appeared to us from the dead. Christ is Risen!

I'll never forget what happened next. After breakfast, Jesus asks me, "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" Jesus had a right and reason to ask me this question. On the night on which He was betrayed, I had boasted of my devotion and love to Jesus before the others. I said that I would lay down my life for Him, and do you know what He said? He said that I would deny Him three times before the rooster crows. He was unfortunately correct.

My denial of Jesus showed a lack of love towards Him. I had denied Him to the small and insignificant of this world. I had denied being one of His disciples to a young servant girl. But it wasn't only to the small and insignificant that I denied knowing Him before.

I denied knowing Him before the normal people of this world, to fellow believers, and even to Pagans! I said that I did not know Jesus. I lied and said that I wasn't a disciple in front of the servants, Jews, and Romans gathered around the fire.

I even outrageously denied being in the garden with Jesus and even being from Galilee although I have a Galilean accent. I went as far as to invoke a curse upon myself saying "I do not know the man!" All of this showed a greater love for myself than for my Lord with my actions. I feared what being associated with Jesus might mean or do to me. Have you ever done something similar?

So I answered Jesus' question. I had learned my lesson about boasting. I humbly answered, "Yes, Lord; you know that I *phileo* you." I said that I loved Jesus like a brother, or a like a family member, which is what the word *phileo* means. I was not willing or able to say *agape*, the word for love that Jesus had used. That word means a deep, sacrificial and unconditional love. I appealed to the Lord's omniscience with my answer. If He searches me, He will know that I love Him. My outer actions cannot currently prove it, but my inner intentions do.

Then Jesus strangely answers, "Feed my lambs." Jesus was using figurative language to say, "Be a pastor. Do what I have called you to be and trained you to do. Take care of my

people. Feed and nourish them with my Word. Tell them they are forgiven because of my death for them. Put my name on them through baptism to mark them as my own. Give them my body and blood for the forgiveness of sins, and for life and salvation. Feed my lambs."

Jesus then asks me a second time, "Simon, son of John, do you *agape* me?" I answered the same way. "Yes, Lord; you know that I *phileo* you." I was remaining humble and was not going to prove a greater love or devotion. I thought before I spoke. Jesus then said, "Tend my sheep." He essentially said the same thing as before. He wants me to take care of His people and to love them. He wants me to watch over them like a shepherd. He wants me to guide, protect, and watch over them.

His questioning was not done yet however. Jesus asked me a third time. "Simon, son of John, do you *phileo* me?" I thought why does He keep asking this? Why is He doing this? What is the point? He knows the answer. He knows that I love Him like a brother. He brought the question to my level but I will stay with my answer. It is the truth. I do not love Him like He loves me.

Now, I would be lying if I said that I didn't feel hurt about this whole exchange. In fact, I felt grieved. This threefold repetition of affirming my love for Jesus echoed for my threefold denial of Him. I am sorry that I had denied him before the insignificant and normal people of this world. I am sorry that I abandoned Him when He needed me most. I am sincerely sorry that I left Him to die and was not on the cross next to Him where I promised to be. It was for me that He died, and I left Him guilty, condemned, and hung on a cross. I was a horrible friend and do not deserve to be called "Peter," or the rock.

But He came to forgive me and reinstate me for service. That was the point of those questions. He again said, "Feed my sheep. Be a pastor" and then proceeded to say how I will glorify Him with my death. He finished it all by saying, "Follow me." All of those things showed my forgiveness. He is not mad or resentful towards me. He has not given up on me but quite the opposite! His sayings show that He can and will use me for His service, and for His Church. They show that He still wants me after I had horribly failed Him. No one would blame Jesus for giving up on me, and for picking someone else.

Instead, the Lord shows His great faithfulness, and commitment towards me. He shows His unconditional and sacrificial love towards me. He shows His forgiveness. He could and did forgive me because of His death on the cross. The very place I had left Him to die at shows my forgiveness when I think of my denial, and in fact, any sin that I have done. What He did for me on the cross allows me to follow Him and confess my love towards Him, and it shows my forgiveness when I *will* fail.
