The Old Testament Reading is written in the book of Genesis, chapter 1, and ending at chapter 2, verse 4.

1 In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth.² The earth was without form and void, and darkness was over the face of the deep. And the Spirit of God was hovering over the face of the waters. ³And God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. ⁴And God saw that the light was good. And God separated the light from the darkness. ⁵God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day. ⁶ And God said, "Let there be an expanse^[a] in the midst of the waters, and let it separate the waters from the waters." ⁷ And God made^[b] the expanse and separated the waters that were under the expanse from the waters that were above the expanse. And it was so. ⁸ And God called the expanse Heaven.^[C] And there was evening and there was morning, the second day. ⁹ And God said, "Let the waters under the heavens be gathered together into one place, and let the dry land appear." And it was so. ¹⁰ God called the dry land Earth,^[d] and the waters that were gathered together he called Seas. And God saw that it was good. ¹¹ And God said, "Let the earth sprout vegetation, plants^[e] yielding seed, and fruit trees bearing fruit in which is their seed, each according to its kind, on the earth." And it was so. ¹² The earth brought forth vegetation, plants yielding seed according to their own kinds, and trees bearing fruit in which is their seed, each according to its kind. And God saw that it was good. ¹³ And there was evening and there was morning, the third day.¹⁴ And God said, "Let there be lights in the expanse of the heavens to separate the day from the night. And let them be for signs and for seasons,^[1] and for days and years, ¹⁵ and let them be lights in the expanse of the heavens to give light upon the earth." And it was so. ¹⁶ And God made the two great lights—the greater light to rule the day and the lesser light to rule the night—and the stars. ¹⁷ And God set them in the expanse of the heavens to give light on the earth, ¹⁸ to rule over the day and over the night, and to separate the light from the darkness. And God saw that it was good. ¹⁹ And there was evening and there was morning, the fourth day.²⁰ And God said, "Let the waters swarm with swarms of living creatures, and let birds^[g] fly above the earth across the expanse of the heavens."²¹ So God created the great sea creatures and every living creature that moves, with which the waters swarm, according to their kinds, and every winged bird according to its kind. And God saw that it was good.²² And God blessed them, saying, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the waters in the seas, and let birds multiply on the earth." ²³ And there was evening and there was morning, the fifth day. ²⁴ And God said, "Let the earth bring forth living creatures according to their kinds—livestock and creeping things and beasts of the earth according to their kinds." And it was so. ²⁵ And God made the beasts of the earth according to their kinds and the livestock according to their kinds, and everything that creeps on the ground according to its kind. And God saw that it was good.

²⁶ Then God said, "Let us make man^[h] in our image, after our likeness. And let them have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over the livestock and over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth."²⁷ So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them. ²⁸ And God blessed them. And God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it, and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over every living thing that moves on the earth."²⁹ And God said, "Behold, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is on the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit. You shall have them for food. ³⁰ And to every beast of the earth and to every bird of the heavens and to everything that creeps on the earth, everything that has the breath of life, I have given every green plant for food." And it was so. ³¹ And God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day. 2 Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all the host of them.² And on the seventh day God finished his work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all his work that he had done. ³So God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it God rested from all his work that he had done in creation.⁴ These are the generations of the heavens and the earth when they were created, in the day that the Lord God made the earth and the heavens.

The Holy Gospel is according to St. Matthew, chapter 28, verses 16-20.

¹⁶ Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. ¹⁷ And when they saw him they worshiped him, but some doubted. ¹⁸ And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. ¹⁹ Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in^[a] the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰ teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

The Sermon: The (Re)Creator

As human beings, we love to create. This love of creating starts at an early age. I see it with my daughter. She loves to create things with her blocks and Legos (and then promptly knock them over). She loves to color with paint, crayons, pens, pencils, markers, and anything else that will leave a residue. When I get home, she loves to show me the art she has made for that day. I have to admit that I cannot always tell what it is, but her pieces are my favorite. She loves to create pretend scenarios and pretend meals. The other day my "coffee" was a pink measuring cup that was served with a slice of cheese. I love seeing the creative things she comes up with! This love of creating doesn't diminish as we become adults. People love to make gardens with vegetables, flowers, and small trees. Others like to make quilts and customizable cups. Adults can enjoy making model airplanes, or building things from Lego's Adult brand. We even enjoy the creations of others, whether that is art, books, movies, or photographs. As human beings, we love to create. And, so does our God. God loves to create. As we celebrate Trinity Sunday, we see a God Who loves to create.

Our text says, "In the beginning." As humans, we have start dates, and will one day have an end date. God has neither. He is eternal. No one and nothing else is eternal. There was no explosion, no bubble of gas, no cosmic dust that could have kindled the germ of life. The earliest forms of life did not originate in a blob of slime on some prehistoric pond that developed hundreds of billions of years through mutations. The elements that make up our universe are not eternal. Only God is. Our universe has a start date. That start date was when God *created* it. The word *create* in Hebrew is a special one. In the Bible, the word *create* is only used of God's activity, and *always* expresses the origin of something extraordinary. What does that say about God's work? It is by *Him*. It is always *extraordinary*. And what did He create? "The heavens and the earth."

"The heavens and the earth" refer to the universe in its initial state. For God's own reasons, He did not see fit to make creation in its completed form. By His will, He created all of the components that would later constitute the universe as we know it, including matter, energy, time and space. On day one, God created all of His raw materials, similar to how a home builder assembles all his nails, wood, pipes, appliances, concrete, dry wall, and whatever else he needs at a site, before making them into a home. This is why verse two says, "**The earth was without form and void, and darkness was over the face of the deep. And the Spirit of God was hovering over the face of the waters.**" And what does God make first? He makes order. He starts with light.

He says, "**Let there be light**," and there was light. God separated the light from the darkness, and called the light Day and the darkness Night. And this was good. We will see this phrase repeated seven times in our text, reminding and teaching us that what comes from God's hand is good. This is the end of day one.

On day two, God introduces three fundamental distinctions in our world: sky, sea, and dry land. "And God said, 'Let there be an expanse in the midst of the waters, and let it separate the waters from the waters.' And God made the expanse and separated the waters that were under the expanse from the waters that were above the expanse. And it was so." What do we call this? "Sky." And like the light, it too, is good. Day two is finished.

Day three of creation is a bit different. It is like constructing a pool. As a kid, my parents bought a pool in a box that claimed "Ready in 15 minutes!" Not sure how they figured that out. Once my Dad flattened the ground, put up the frame, and inserted the liner, which took longer than 15 minutes, we could finally add the water. Only once the frame and shape was up, then could the pool be filled. On day three, God continues His separating and ordering of creation, but also begins to fill it. He will have the "frame" finished. He now needs to fill it.

So God separates the water from the dry ground, and creates land and sea. With those now in place, God says, "**Let the earth sprout vegetation**." With that Word, ferns, roses, hibiscuses, and cactus appear. Pine, willow, oak, maple, apple, pear, and cherry trees sprout. The earth is dosed with every shade of green, and complimented with the beautiful colors the world's flowers have to offer. Day three ends, and like the others, everything here, too, is good.

On day four, our eyes are pointed above as God makes sun, moon, and stars. Psalm 8 says, "your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place". It creates a wonderful picture, doesn't it? And God places them there for light, and as a way to tell time and seasons. As modern city dwellers, I don't think we fully grasp the importance of this since we have street and house lights. We don't see how dark nature can get. I remember driving back to Fort Wayne, Indiana, late at night, and I never realized how dark rural Indiana can be. The darkness on route 30 seemed to be all encompassing, and seemed to wrap itself around my little Honda. If it wasn't for some of the other truckers in the distance, and the faint stars in the sky, it would have been pitch black! God set them up there for our benefit. These things, too, are good, and day four comes to a close.

On day five, the world begins to teem and overflow with life. God says, "Let the waters swarm with swarms of living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the expanse of the heavens." With that, the ocean is filled with star fish, sharks, whales, eels, and other

living creatures. Ponds and lakes are filled with bass, walleyes, and whatever else Minnesotans try to fish. The sky is now populated with robins, loons, ducks, eagles, and anything else with wings. And God blesses all of these things, telling them to be fruitful and to multiply. Like the rest, these things, too, are good, and day five comes to a close.

On day six, God creates land animals, and then the piece de resistance. He saves the best for last. He creates man and woman. "Then God said, 'Let us make man in our image, after our likeness. And let them have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over the livestock and over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth.' So God created man in his own image, in the image of God He created Him; male and female He created them." Did you notice the *plural*? The use of *we*. "Let us make man in our image." This shows the three in one nature of God. Did you catch the word *create*? It was used three times in relation to the creation of humanity! Remember *create* in the Bible is only in reference to God and refers to something *extraordinary*! What does that say about humanity? What does that say about you? Humanity is special.

It is given dominion over the earth and everything in it! Psalm 8 notes that God cares for man. He has made us a little lower than the angels and crowns us with glory and honor. We are created in His image! What does that mean? It doesn't mean that we look like God. The image of God means that humanity was created in righteousness. Man had true knowledge of God. Man had true fear, trust, and confidence in Him. How amazing! And God calls all of his creation good, and then rests on the seventh day. Our God loves to create!

What a wonderful picture of man and creation we have here in Genesis 1! But, does this picture remain? Is this same picture of the world? No. Not all. We see chaos, not order. We see natural disasters. We have droughts, weeds, and storms. Animals can be unruly and dangerous. Is this the same picture of man? The world would say "yes," but the Bible screams "no!" Through Adam and Eve's fall into sin, we have lost the image of God. We have no natural righteousness. We have no knowledge of God. We have no true fear, trust, or confidence in Him. One of my favorite commentators, Jeske, says that we have minds ignorant of God's good plan for us, emotions that find joy in things that displease Him, and wills that rebel against His good and gracious will. Our Lutheran confessions are not any kinder when it talks about original sin and our losing the image of God. It says, "That not only is original sin (in human nature) such a complete lack of all good in spiritual, divine matters, but also that at the same time it replaces the lost image of God in the human being with a deep-seated, evil, horrible, bottomless, unfathomable, and indescribable corruption of the entire human nature and of all its powers, particularly of the highest, most important powers of the soul, in mind, heart, and will." Lutherans can be a little pessimistic when it comes to humans, can't we? So much for a good creation! What a tragedy for a God who loves to create!

But, fortunately, He also loves *to recreate*. He doesn't leave us fallen and broken. The God Who creates also re-creates. He is restoring His image in a fallen and broken world. When sin entered the world through Adam, the image of God in us was lost, but God acted. He promised and sent a Savior. God sent Jesus into the world. Jesus, Who is the true and exact image of God the Father. Jesus, the One Who shows us true man, without sin. In Jesus, the image that we lost lives! Jesus is the One Who knows His Father. Jesus is the One Who has complete trust, fear, and confidence in Him. Jesus is the righteous One!

But Jesus didn't come into the world to restore the image of God for only *a time*, but for *all time*. Jesus took upon himself our sin, our punishment, our death, our broken image, and in return gives us His Spirit. Through the Holy Spirit, the image of God is again given to us.

Through the Holy Spirit, we are *re-created*, made new, forgiven, loved, restored, and called "good" in God's sight. We are being conformed into the image of Jesus, who is the image of God, daily through our baptism. What was once lost in Genesis is now being restored in Jesus, and will come to completion at the Last Day, where we will experience an ordered creation and life that is once again very good. Our God loves to create, but He also loves to *recreate*, too.

Prayer of the Church

O blessed and holy Trinity, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, hear the prayers of Your people and grant to us all things according to Your Word and promise.

Brief silence

In the beginning, Father, Your Word spoke all things into being and from nothing You made all that is. Help us to see the imprint of Your love in the goodness of creation and to exercise responsible care of all that You have entrusted to us. Lord, in Your mercy, **hear our prayer**. Throughout the ages, Father, Your Spirit filled the sin-stained world with hope and called us to repentance and faith. Help us to hear the voice of Your Word and to respond with faith, confessing You without fear before all manner of people and in every corner of the earth. As You planned long before the world began, deliver us in Christ, that we may be Your own and live according to Your commands all our days. Lord, in Your mercy, **hear our prayer**. In this day and in this time, Father, raise up for Your Church godly men to serve her as pastors and faithful teachers and church workers to make known Your saving Gospel. Raise up faithful servants who will heed Your call and serve to the best of their ability wherever You place them. Lord, in Your mercy, **hear our prayer**.

In Baptism, You joined us to our Savior's death and resurrection, Father. Guide us, that we may live out faithfully the new lives born of water and the Spirit, serving You with all our bodies, minds, souls and strength. In the face of disease and death, make us bold to expect that we will be united with Him in a resurrection like His. Lord, in Your mercy, **hear our prayer**. In government and law, Father, You work to establish and preserve order, protecting the weak and fostering godly virtue. Bless all who defend us in the armed forces, aid us in emergency and medical fields, and inform us with news. Hinder those who oppress any peoples with mistruth, violence or fear.
