Thus says the Lord, the King of Israel and his Redeemer, the Lord of hosts: "I am the first and I am the last; besides me there is no god. Who is like me? Let him proclaim it. Let him declare and set it before me, since I appointed an ancient people. Let them declare what is to come, and what will happen. Fear not, nor be afraid; have I not told you from of old and declared it? And you are my witnesses! Is there a God besides me? There is no Rock; I know not any."

Pastor: This is the Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God.

EPISTLE Romans 8:18–27

For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us. For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the sons of God. For the creation was subjected to futility, not willingly, but because of him who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. For we know that the whole creation has been groaning together in the pains of childbirth until now. And not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for adoption as sons, the redemption of our bodies. For in this hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For

who hopes for what he sees? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience. Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness. For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words. And he who searches hearts knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God.

HOLY GOSPEL *Matthew 13:24–30, 36–43*

Pastor: The Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew, the thirteenth chapter.

People: Glory to You, O Lord.

[Jesus] put another parable before them, saying, "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field, but while his men were sleeping, his enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat and went away. So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared also. And the servants of the master of the house came and said to him, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? How then does it have weeds?' He said to them, 'An enemy has done this.' So the servants said to him, 'Then do you want us to go and gather them?' But he said, 'No, lest in gathering the weeds you root up the wheat along with them. Let both grow together until the harvest, and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Gather the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn." . . . Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples came to him, saying, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field." He answered, "The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man. The field is the world, and the good seed is the children of the kingdom. The weeds are the sons of the evil one, and the enemy who sowed them is the devil. The harvest is the close of the age, and the reapers are angels. Just as the weeds are gathered and burned with fire, so will it be at the close of the age. The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will gather out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all law-breakers, and throw them into the fiery furnace. In that place there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. He who has ears, let him hear."

Pastor: This is the Gospel of the Lord. **People: Praise to You, O Christ.**

Back in 1997, Maxine Clark opened the first Build-A-Bear workshop at the Galleria Shopping Center in St. Louis, Missouri. Today, there are over 400 stores worldwide. We even have one in Roseville and at the Mall of America. It is a place I have been to many times with brothers, sisters, nephew, and daughter. If you have never been to Build-A-Bear, let me tell you the rules and how it goes. First, you choose from over 30 different types of stuffed animals, including not just bears, but also dogs, cats, bunnies, and sharks. They even have Disney themed animals! Once you pick your animal, you then stuff it, stitch it, fluff it, dress it, accessorize it, and name it! The end result is that you have your "berry" own bear! And, then, to prove it, you are given a customized birth certificate. This is your creation! Ta da! (and then comes checkout!)

In our Old Testament text, Israel finds herself in Babylon, exiled. The people are far from home and are living under a foreign power. Israel in Babylonian captivity wasn't building bears or stuffed animals; they were building gods! That is why God reminds them in our text, Isaiah 44:6, that there is only one God. He reminds that "The LORD is the King of Israel and Redeemer, The Lord of Hosts, The First and the Last."

He says He is "the LORD," the Almighty, Yahweh. He is the God of the covenant and the God of free and faithful grace. He is "the King of Israel." The people might be living in Babylon, and they endured some poor, ineffective, and powerless kings in their country, but He is still their King and the true King of this world. He is the One Who is truly in charge! He is the "Redeemer." He is the deliverer and Savior of His people, time and time again. He is the "Lord of Hosts." "Hosts" means and refers to armies. To those who are living in a chaotic world of sin, danger, and heartache, God reminds us and them that He is in control over the forces and events that happen in Heaven and earth. He is "The First and the Last." Nothing is before Him; nothing will be after Him. He is the Creator! This is the God of Israel. This is your God, and my God. There is no god besides this God. He is the solid Rock. All other gods are sinking sand!

But, because of their idolatry, the exiles were slow to believe these claims. Why? They were spending time in Babylonian build-a-god workshops, so to say. Isaiah describes the tools and the trade just a few verses later in 13 to 17. To make these gods, they use pencils, planes, compass, cutting tools, fire, precious metals and wood. They shape them into the figure of a man to dwell in the house. The wood they don't use for the fire to cook dinner, or to warm themselves, becomes the idol. See anything weird, here?

Isaiah tells us the names of these Babylonian gods in 46:1. They are "Bel" and "Nebo". Bel is the title of the god Marduk. He was allegedly the "King of the Universe." Nebo was the son of Marduk and, as the god of writing and wisdom, was keeper of the Tablets of Destiny. Babylonians believed Nebo gave them knowledge and understanding.

Just as Israel was slow to trust their God, we find ourselves in a similar plight. There is a part in all of us that delights in, shall we say, "creative craftsmanship." We conceive it in our minds. We build it with our hands. We choose how it looks. We personalize it with our preferences. It's just what we want in a god. It's a god who likes what I like, hates what I hate, and who shares my opinions. It's a god who increases my standard of living and happiness. This is a god who gives me what I want and stays out of my way the rest of the time. John Calvin states that the human heart is a perpetual idol factory. Commenting on the First Commandment, Luther states in the Large Catechism that "Whatever you set your heart on and put your trust in is truly your god." All the sudden that doesn't look or seem like the Triune God, does it?

What are some of the idols that you and I are building? What do we put our heart and trust in? It can be our leaders, whether it be President Trump or Vice President Biden, and their philosophies and direction for the

country. It can be money, in how it can seemingly buy everything, whether happiness, health, home, or hobbies. It can be doctors with their wisdom and guidance, and the potential of a medication or treatment. It can be us, with our skills, talents, and abilities. It can be technology, and how it seemingly has an answer for everything, or will. Maybe it is people, vacations, our status or possessions. All of these things are good, and are gifts of God. What isn't "good" is how we sometimes use them, what we make with them.

Isaiah tells us the problem with idols. In 46:1, he calls idols 'atsabim, which is translated in the ESV as "idols." Interestingly, the word also means "pain." For example, the word also appears in Genesis 3:16 to describe Eve's pain in childbearing, and it is again used in Genesis 3:17 to denote Adam's pain at working the ground, which is now cursed and full of thorns and thistles. Idols bring pain. Idols bring the same misery, heartache, and pain experienced by our first parents in the Garden of Eden!

Elsewhere, Isaiah calls idols 'epes, which means "nothing." Isaiah maintains that those who follow idols believe in nothing of substance, care for nothing that matters, and seek to know nothing of importance. They find no purpose in nothing that lasts, live for nothing that endures, and remain alive because when it comes to something to die for, there is absolutely nothing. Why? They are created! They are powerless. They are nothing.

In the verse immediately after our text, the prophet continues by calling idols *tohu*. The Hebrew word *tohu* first appears in Genesis 1:2 to describe the world before God speaks it into existence. It says, "the earth was without form and void, and darkness was over the face of the deep." Idols are embodiments of disorder and despair; they are formless and void. People addicted to them get lost in a sea of chaos, where God cannot be seen or heard. They are chaos.

But, why do idols have such power? Paul asserts in 1 Corinthians 10:20 that idol worship is worship "offered to demons." Idols have such magnetizing power to imprison and take from us our God-given humanity because Satan is the spiritual reality behind every addiction, every compulsion, every obsession. It's no wonder David writes in Psalm 16:4, "The sorrows of those who run after another god shall multiply." So, what is the answer?

In the context of such massive idolatry, we have a Word from God: Isaiah 44:6: "Thus says the LORD, the King of Israel and his Redeemer, the LORD of hosts: 'I am the first and the last; besides me there is no god." Jesus is LORD, Yahweh, God in the flesh come for you and me! He is King, ruler of the Universe. Jesus is Your King Who died for you. He is Redeemer, the One Who delivers us from sin and helps in our time of need. He is the Lord of Hosts. He is in control of our lives, directing and leading them. What happens in our lives is and will be worked out for our good in Jesus (although it may not seem like it). He is the first and the last, Jesus says as much! In Revelation, He proclaims, "Fear not, I am the first and the last, and the living one. I died, and behold I am alive forevermore, and I have the keys of Death and Hades."

Because Jesus bled and died in our place, Jesus alone demonstrates that He alone is able to heal our hurts, forgive our filth, and defeat our death. No wonder the Bible says that idols are nothing and chaos, and only increase our pain because a cross-less god is no god at all. A god who doesn't suffer, a god who knows no agony, a god who doesn't die-this is a god without grace, a god who cannot deliver, and a god who offers no hope and no future.

But that is not Jesus! He is crucified, but risen indeed! He is alive! So it is time to turn in our tools, stop building our substitutes, to throw away the idols, and never, ever do business again a build-a-god workshop. We have Jesus, the LORD, the King, the Redeemer, the LORD of Hosts, and the First and the Last. What else do we need?
