EPISTLE *Romans* 5:1–11

Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Through him we have also obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand, and we rejoice in hope of

the glory of God. More than that, we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us. For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. For one will scarcely die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die—but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Since, therefore, we have now been justified by his blood, much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God. For if while we were enemies we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, much more, now that we are reconciled, shall we be saved by his life. More than that, we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

Pastor: This is the Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God.

HOLY GOSPEL Mark 8:27–38

Pastor: The Holy Gospel according to St. Mark, the eighth chapter.

People: Glory to You, O Lord.

And Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi. And on the way he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" And they told him, "John the Baptist; and others say, Elijah; and others, one of the prophets." And he asked them, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter answered him, "You are the Christ." And he strictly charged them to tell no one about him. And he began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes and be killed, and after three days rise again. And he said this plainly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and seeing his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are not setting your mind on the things of God, but on the things of man." And he called to him the crowd with his disciples and said to them, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and the gospel's will save it. For what does it profit a man to gain the whole world and forfeit his life? For what can a man give in return for his life? For whoever is ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of him will the Son of Man also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

SERMON "What does that mean?" Romans 5:1-11

On one of the warmer nights this week, the Kooi family went on a walk after dinner. I was pulling Mia in her wagon, while Dawn was walking our dog Spritz on her leash. As the sun was beginning to set, she said,

"We have to start heading home since it is getting dark out, and the sun is setting." The little voice in the wagon said, "Why. Why is the sun setting?" "That is a good question," I thought to myself. Dawn answered her saying, "Well, that is because the earth rotates, which makes it set." To that, Mia said, "Why? What does that mean?" Again, another good question. How do you explain something like the earth's rotation in general, let alone to a toddler? To my wife's credit, she simply explained it in a way that Mia could understand. Her answer made me wonder how I would have answered that question, along with the inevitable follow-up question: "Why?" or, "What does *that* mean?" It is a good question to ask, isn't it? Children love to ask that question as it helps them to explore, discover, and learn more about the world around them. What does that mean?

It can be a helpful question for our faith as well. It is no wonder why Martin Luther uses it all throughout his catechism as he teaches the faith. That question helps us to learn, explore, and discover the richness and depth of our Christian faith.

As Christians, we can hear a lot of words in our faith, words like *prophets*, *apostles*, *joy*, *faith*, *love*, *and forgiveness*. We can hear a lot of terms, phrases, and concepts like *inspiration*, *canon*, *Messiah*, *the Old Man*, *or baptismal regeneration*. However, can we explain what they mean? Could we answer the follow-up questions to those answers? Could you explain one of the most important words and concepts of our faith, *justify*? If you had to explain it, could you? Could you tell someone what it means? This morning, Paul employs this helpful method by asking, "What does this mean?" He tells us what it means to be justified, along with the follow-up answers.

"Therefore, since we have been justified by faith...." What does that mean? Justifed? Simply put, to be justified means "to be declared righteous," that is, perfectly just and holy according to God's standards. We know that we don't even come close to them. The word *justify* creates a courtroom imagery.

You have the Judge, that is, God the Father. You have the person on trial, that is, you! You have the prosecutor, which in the book of Romans, is the Law, the Ten Commandments, and it builds its case against *you*. It says, "Your honor, the defendant has grievously and repeatedly broken your Law. Just today, they have already loved other things more than you. That have misused Your Name, and have slandered the governing authorities. They have lusted in their heart, burned with rage against the person who cut them off coming here, and they told their children some white lies. Tomorrow, they have plans to covet and deal deceptively with their neighbor. I can show you evidence from *everyday* of their existence of countless other infractions. The evidence is too overwhelming and voluminous to present. I rest my case."

The verdict? It is going to be guilty! You cannot argue your way out of this one, and no lawyer can clear your charges. The sentence? It is going to be eternal death and separation from God. But before the gavel is swung, and the verdict declared, our Advocate and defender appears, Jesus Christ. He says, "I have endured the punishment on their behalf, and I give them my righteousness." As a result, the judge looks at us, and with a swing of the gavel, says, "Not guilty!" and declares us justified and righteous by faith for Christ's sake.

Faith isn't a work, but faith is the means by which the believer receives Jesus' righteousness. In God's sight, we are righteous because of Jesus. We are declared "not guilty." We are justified by faith. What does that mean? Peace.

"Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." Often, when we think of peace, we often think of the *absence* of something. Maybe it is guilty, worry, problems, conflict, or sadness. We might even associate it with a relaxed feeling, quietness, or nothingness. When the Bible talks of peace, the dominant and overarching notion is that of a restored relationship. It has a different focus.

Our old relationship with God was not good at all. Paul tells us what we were, and what that old relationship was like. He said we were "weak/powerless." We were unable and incapable of saving ourselves. We were spiritually dead in our sins, and were unable to please and come to Him. Paul said we were "ungodly," that is, without God. We were not His. He was not ours. We were "sinners." We constantly and only fell short of God's demands. We were "enemies," that is, actively opposed to God and were under wrath. Since we have been justified, declared righteous by faith in Christ, we have peace.

Our new relationship with God is completely different. We are not weak and powerless, but are made alive in Him. We live for Him and others in response to the wonderful new life and grace He has given us. We

are no longer "ungodly" but *God's* through the waters of baptism, where He adopted and claimed us as His own. We are no longer enemies, but friends. The wrath is removed and satisfied by Christ. We are made right with *Him*. The separation is removed. The wall is torn down. The chasm is filled. We have peace with God. All is right and well with Him through Jesus Christ. "Since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." And what does that mean? We have access.

"Through Him we have also obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand...." With the word *access*, Paul gives us another picture image. It conveys the idea of entering before a king, like in a palace or temple. Since we have peace, our relationship is right with God, we are free to come to God's throne of grace with any and every petition. He invites us to come to Him, and to pour out our heart before Him. What weighs on your heart and mind? Is a sin troubling you? Is there a fear or stress that wakes you up at night and pins you to the sheets with fright? Tell Him. Is there something you want to thank Him for? Let Him know what blessings and gifts that He richly provides for you that you are appreciative and thankful for. We have access...and our access is into this grace, in which we stand.

Note that this is a present thing. Grace is not a one-time gift. We live in it eternally. As Christians, we live our entire life in this grace. It won't ever run dry or run out. There is no limit or ration. Grace is God's undeserved mercy and kindness. Our relationship with Him is based on this. I don't have to worry about messing things up, or think that I have to find a way to stay on God's good side. I don't have to fear that He will stop being good to me, or that He will treat me differently because of something I have done. That's not grace. Our relationship and life is based on His undeserved mercy and kindness. "Since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Through Him we have also obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand...." And what does that mean? It means that we have hope.

A few months ago, I finished a book about a man named Hans who endured five years in a Russian labor camp, also known as a Gulag. His perseverance was remarkable amidst the bleak circumstances. His typical day would begin with a two-hour walk to the mine, where there he would put in a ten-hour shift. His tools were pick-axes, shovels, and a wheel barrel. After his shift, he would do the two hour walk back to camp to receive his dinner, which was watery soup and a piece of bread the size of his palm. His bed was three pieces of wood with lice-ridden hay. That first winter, Hans said over half of the 4,000 prisoners died. The main reason? Hopelessness. He said he saw healthy people die from hopelessness. He remarked that those who made it home where those who held on to the hope that they would one day be released. Hope. Hope sustains in difficult trials. Hope points ahead to brighter and better days. Hope pushes us forward when a step seems almost impossible to take. As Christians, what is our hope? "The glory of God."

We have the promise of eternal life in Heaven. We have the hope of a fully restore experience of His image and presence in eternity. We have the hope that we will share in Christ's victory. What we have now is just a tiny foretaste of the unspeakably greater joy of sharing in the glories of heaven and God Himself. This glorious hope makes bearable our inevitable crosses and difficulties that come in life. This glorious hope also changes how we see them.

Bo Giertz summarizes and applies the next verses well. He says, "We can even be proud and rejoice in our suffering. We know that God changes them into something good when we bear them in faith in Christ. Essentially, they teach us perseverance. The way home to God passes through many hardships, temptations, and persecutions. But these things do not break us. They make us stronger. And precisely because we stand to the test, our hope is solidified-the hope that we all share in Christ's victory when He comes in glory. This hope is not an illusion. It proceeds from the fact that here and now Christ is powerful to keep us standing in all difficulties. There is further proof that this hope is not an illusion, Paul says." What is that proof?

"Because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us." God is generous in pouring out His love to us. It is like an overwhelming flood. That love is poured out through His Holy Spirit, whom He gifts to us through baptism and the Word. The hope that we have is enduring and true.

"We have been justified by faith." What does that mean? "we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Through Him we have also obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand, and we rejoice in hope of the glory of God. More than that, we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and

hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us."
