You shall not make for yourself a carved image, or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or serve them, for I the Lord your God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers on the children to the third and the fourth generation of those who hate me, but showing steadfast love to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments. You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain, for the Lord will not hold him guiltless who takes his name in vain.

EPISTLE 1 Corinthians 1:18–31

The word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart." Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, it pleased God through the folly of what we preach to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks seek wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men. For consider your calling, brothers: not many of you were wise according to worldly standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; God chose what is low and despised in the world, even things that are not, to bring to nothing things that are, so that no human being might boast in the presence of God. He is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, whom God made our wisdom and our righteousness and sanctification and redemption. Therefore, as it is written, "Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord."

Pastor: This is the Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God.

HOLY GOSPEL John 2:13-25

Pastor: The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the second chapter.

People: Glory to You, O Lord.

The Passover of the Jews was at hand, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found those who were selling oxen and sheep and pigeons, and the money-changers sitting there. And making a whip of cords, he drove them all out of the temple, with the sheep and oxen. And he poured out the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. And he told those who sold the pigeons, "Take these things away; do not make my Father's house a house of trade." His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." So the Jews said to him, "What sign do you show us for doing these things?" Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews then said, "It has taken forty-six years to build this temple, and will you raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking about the temple of his body. When therefore he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the Scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken. Now when he was in Jerusalem at the Passover Feast, many believed in his name when they saw the signs that he was doing. But Jesus on his part did not entrust himself to them, because he knew all people and needed no one to bear witness about man, for he himself knew what was in man.

Pastor: This is the Gospel of the Lord. **People: Praise to You, O Christ.**

APOSTLES' CREED

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell. SERMON "Clutter"

Have you ever had a problem with clutter? We all have that place where "stuff" seems to collect...and stay. Maybe it is the first drawer by the front door, or that cabinet above the microwave. Perhaps the garage, shed, or basement is that place. As the old saying goes, "Out of sight, out of mind." A desk, table, or bed, can also be common landing places for clutter. We all have places where things gather and collect.

Clutter can create some challenges, and issues, though. Clutter can prevent the intended use of a space; there might be too much stuff gathering there that the place becomes unusable. Clutter can also distract. There might be so many things that can draw your attention or redirect your focus. It can also be unhelpful with so much stuff at one place, or even overwhelming to tackle. You might wonder, "Where do I put it? Where do I start?" and that can lead us to just leaving it where it is. Worst of all, though, clutter can prevent something important. If your bed, desk or table has too much stuff on it, you might not be able to rest, work, or eat a meal with your loved ones.

Clutter can do all of this. It can distract, prevent an intended use, and take away from something important. While we all can have clutter in our lives, we need to be aware of another type, too: spiritual clutter. We can have things, practices, and behaviors that can prevent us, hinder us, and distract us from receiving what is truly important, Jesus and the gifts that He gives, whether in worship, or in life.

In the spring of 2016, I remember a noticeable instance of this. I just received the call to be the pastor at Emmaus, and had a big to do list. I had to plan and prepare for a 560 mile move. I needed to find a home in a place and state that neither my wife or I had ever been to. We knew no one in St. Paul, let alone Minnesota. I still had to work and finish up my schooling, which included a 20 page term paper, other written assignments, a final 50% of my grade, and an hour long theological interview in which anything and everything was fair game. I also had to say goodbye to friends and people who I had grown close to in four years; others, I had known for over eight! I remember sitting in chapel one Wednesday, being utterly unable to focus. I tried to listen to the readings and sermon, but these things pulled my mind and attention in other directions. I struggled to hear and listen. I was there, but I wasn't *there*, if you know what I mean. I had so much "clutter" in my mind and life, that I struggled in receiving Jesus and the gifts that He gives.

What spiritual clutter do you have in your life? What prevents, distracts, or hinders you from receiving Jesus and the gifts that He gives? For some of us, COVID-19 has certainly created some clutter through mandates, regulations, and restrictions. If COVID hasn't cluttered your spiritual life, what else has? Is it anxiety over employment, or a rift with a friend? Is it questions about how much longer you can live on your own? Is it the shame and ghosts of past sins, or is it the siren song of temptation? Maybe, your priorities are all out of whack and order. What is at the bottom should be up top. As you come to the Divine Service and live your life, these things can occupy our attention and hearts, and clutter our lives. The result? We can lose focus of Jesus and He can seem so far away.

If you have ever experienced a sense of clutter in your spiritual life, our text from John is a real joy. Jesus enters the Jerusalem temple which is crowded and cluttered and "cleanses" it. Dare I say, He "declutters" it. The term might lack the religious language of cleansing, but it certainly captures the work that Jesus does. Our Lord enters our cluttered attempts at worship and life, and clears a way so that we experience the presence of God and receive His gifts.

John tells us that Jesus went up to Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover, the chief festival of Judaism. As He enters the temple, He sees quite a scene. He finds a market established and conducted in the temple and her halls, and He witnesses all the sights and sounds that go with it. He sees and hears the haggling of buyers and sellers ("How about five dollars for that ox?" "No way, this is temple certified and the best of the bunch. Ten

dollars, and not a cent lower." "Let's meet in the middle at \$7.50" "Fine...deal."). He hears the lowing of cattle and sees the huge pen that they occupy. He hears the baaing of sheep and sees some stray wool on the ground. He hears the cooing of pigeons and sees their cages stacked by the wall. He hears the clanking of coins and sees people getting overcharged as currency is exchanged, and the temple tax paid. The temple is unrecognizable. Its purpose is skewed. Distractions abound. It is...cluttered.

The thing with clutter is that it usually means and starts well. The people travelling to Jerusalem did need animals for sacrifice. It was impractical, if not *impossible*, for them to travel long distances with them. Have you ever traveled with an animal? It isn't easy, nor, is it always fun. The animals that were provided were a needed thing. The money changers were, too. People needed to pay the temple tax and to have the correct coinage. The clutter meant well...but didn't end well. It did what clutter often does.

These things distracted. How can you pray and worship when you hear the bleating of goats, the coos of pigeons, and the bartering of buyers and sellers? How can you pray and worship in the middle of a marketplace full of currency exchange counters and animal pens? You can't. These things belonged outside of it. They did not belong in it.

These things also prevented the temple's intended use: it was to be a place of prayer and worship. It wasn't meant to be a marketplace and place of profit. These things also led the people away from what was important: the temple was the meeting place for God and man; It was where He gives His people His gifts and blessings. Instead, it had become a house of trade.

As Jesus looks at all of the clutter, He acts. Zeal for God's house consumes Him. He makes a whip of cords, and John says, "**He drove them all out of the temple,**" Jesus gives it a thorough cleansing. He removes *all* the clutter. Anything that doesn't belong there is removed. He removes the clutter so God's people can worship, and so they can see, hear, and experience the most important thing: the wonder of a Father in Heaven Who offers them forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation.

As you can rightfully assume, John records the confrontation that ensues. "So the Jews said to him, 'What sign do you show us for doing these things?" With His response, He makes a profound point and truth. He points to the greater temple and sacrifice. He says, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." John tells us "But He was speaking about the temple of His body." The body of Jesus is where God dwelt and was made manifest. The sacrifices that were done in the temple pointed forward to, and found their fulfillment in His once for all sacrifice on the cross for the sins of the world. Jesus came to declutter.

As we go through this season of Lent, what clutter does your life have? What distracts you from Him? What hinders your walk of faith? Know that Jesus continues His decluttering work *today*. On that spring Wednesday in 2016, I had a hard time focusing because of all that I had going on. But as I stepped forward for communion that day, I received what I truly needed. My Lord's work and gifts came to me, and nothing was going to stop it. He continues His work today, but His tools are fortunately different. They aren't a whip, but they are something else.

Jesus uses bread and wine that deliver His body and blood for the forgiveness of sins. Through His Supper, He strengthens us and our faith. He gives us life and salvation. He gives us peace, a right relationship with God, and dismisses us in joy. He works and declutters through water and the Word, baptism. There, our sinful nature is daily put to death, and the new man daily emerges to live before God in righteousness and purity forever. We live in the grace given to us there, along with our identity as God's beloved and forgiven children.

Jesus uses His Word to equip, encourage, restore, guide, and teach us. He works through His Spirit to renew our heart, lives, and minds, and to make us more like Him. What is more is that Jesus comes to dwell among us in grace, providing forgiveness for the penitent, life to the dying, strength to the weak, hope for the hopeless, and rescue for the powerless. He has come to remove our clutter.

In these days of COVID, it is easy to become distracted. It is easy to be exhausted with regulations. It is easy to be frustrated by all the clutter in our lives. However, Jesus promises to be here, clearing it away, so we know God's desire: to be with us, to bless us with His gifts, and to receive us at His table.
