CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION

Pastor: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

People: Amen.

Pastor: Our help is in the name of the Lord, **People: who made heaven and earth.**

Pastor: If You, O Lord, kept a record of sins, O Lord, who could stand? **People: But with You there is forgiveness; therefore You are feared.**

Pastor: Since we are gathered to hear God's Word, call upon Him in prayer and praise, and receive the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ in the fellowship of this altar, let us first consider our unworthiness and confess before God and one another that we have sinned in thought, word, and deed, and that we cannot free ourselves from our sinful condition. FIRST READING *Numbers* 21:4–9

From Mount Hor they set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom. And the people became impatient on the way. And the people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we loathe this worthless food." Then the Lord sent fiery serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many people of Israel died. And the people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned, for we have spoken against the Lord and against you. Pray to the Lord, that he take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a fiery serpent and set it on a pole, and everyone who is bitten, when he sees it, shall live." So Moses made a bronze serpent and set it on a pole. EPISTLE *Ephesians 2:1–10*

And you were dead in the trespasses and sins in which you once walked, following the course of this world, following the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work in the sons of disobedience— among

whom we all once lived in the passions of our flesh, carrying out the desires of the body and the mind, and were by nature children of wrath, like the rest of mankind. But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved— and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the coming ages he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them.

Pastor: This is the Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God.

HOLY GOSPEL *John 3:14–21*

Pastor: The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the third chapter.

People: Glory to You, O Lord.

[Jesus said:] "As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe is condemned already, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God. And this is the judgment: the light has come into the world, and people loved the darkness rather than the light because their deeds were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come to the light, lest his deeds should be exposed. But whoever does what is true comes to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that his deeds have been carried out in God."

Pastor: This is the Gospel of the Lord. **People: Praise to You, O Christ.**

APOSTLES' CREED

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell. SERMON "Take A Bite" John 3:16

- I. "For God..."
 - What is the subject of the sentence? Why is that important?
- II. "...so loved...."

Growing up, I remember my Great Grandfather talking about an event he once spoke at. It was a sending event for a missionary, and he was one of the people chosen to tell them a Bible verse. As he went up to speak, he said, "The first thing that came to my mind to tell you was John 3:16, the most important verse in the entire Bible. It is the message that you will proclaim, and the message that you cannot forget, but I know that *you* know this...so I will tell you another one, instead." I don't recall the second verse, but His observation always stuck with me. He is right. John 3:16 is one of the most important verses in the entire Bible, *if not*, the most important. As one commentator says, "[John 3:16 is] a burst of Gospel-preaching which is without equal in the world's literature, which, in fact, summarizes the entire Gospel in one sentence."

For our sermon this morning, I want to approach this well-known and important verse a little bit differently. The approach is like eating a sweet dessert. When eating a dessert, you don't want to eat too much at once, or to scarf it down. Rather, you want to take small bites. You want to savor the richness of the flavors. You want your mouth to experience all of the tastes. You want to enjoy the sweetness, the frosting, the coolness, and chocolate. Taking big bites prevents that. Taking big bites will prevent that. Instead, taking small bites is the key to enjoying it. The same goes for John 3:16. We want to take it in chunks, in bite-sized pieces, so we can fully take it in. Doing so will allow us to enjoy the richness, depth, and beauty of the Bible's greatest passage.

Let's take our first bite. "For God...." With our first bite, we are introduced to the subject and focus of the entire sentence, God. He is the subject of the sentence. John tells us that the origin and initiative in salvation lies with God, not us. He does it all; we have no part to play in salvation. We simply receive.

One thing that Lutheran theology does so well is that it gets the subject and object, right. If you mess that up, your entire theology will be skewed, and it will inevitably be wrong. In theology, God is the subject. He is the actor, the doer. He does the action. He is the subject of the verbs. And the objects? Us. We are the objects. All we do is receive. We are passive. God acts *to us and for us*.

A great example of this is our Epistle text, Ephesians 2:4-10. In this passage, notice the subject of the verbs. Notice who is the object. "But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which HE LOVED US, even when we were dead in our trespasses, MADE US ALIVE TOGETHER with Christ-by grace YOU HAVE BEEN SAVED-and RAISED US UP WITH HIM and SEATED US WITH HIM in the heavenly places in Jesus Christ. [For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift God, not a result of works, so that no one boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them." God is the subject. We are the objects. In the Bible's most famous and important passage, God is the subject and actor. Let's take our next bite.

"...so loved...." The English language has the most words of any language in the world. The number of words in the English language? One million. The number of words for love? Just, one. In Greek, there are four words for love, and the one used here is agape. Agape is an unconditional love; it is a sacrificial love. A "spontaneous, unmerited, and creative love." This love is more than a feeling. It is a action and resolve. This love doesn't dream passively. It acts purposefully. It doesn't act on the likability or worthiness of the object, but it acts for the interest of the object. This is the love that God has. That is important to keep in mind as we take our next bite. Savor this last point because this next bite doesn't go down as smooth.

"...the world...." In John's Gospel, the world doesn't recognize Jesus, or receive Him (1:10-11). In John's Gospel, the world is the enemy of God. It hates Him. It hates Jesus, and it hates us, His followers (15:18). It is in the world that we will have tribulation (16:33), and Satan is the prince of it. Fortunately, God does not reciprocate those things. He loves the world.

In John's Gospel, Jesus is the Savior of the world (4:42). He takes away the sin of the world (1:29). He gives His life for the world (6:33). He is the light of the world (8:12). He overcomes the prince of the world, Satan, and overcomes the world (16:33).

That is a comfort because I'm included in it. You are included in it. We are the world. Sadly, that means we don't always recognize or receive Him. Sadly, it means that often rebel against Him. It means that we can let Satan and our sinful flesh control the direction and priorities of our lives. But, remember, God loves...the world.

God loves the world that He had created, even though the crown of creation, mankind, became corrupted and ruined it all. Our sin did not stop God from loving us. Our sin doesn't stop God from loving us. The sins of Adam and Eve, Abraham and Sarah, Moses and Pharoah, Saul and David, Judas and Peter, Paul and John, you and me- God knew them all, and yet, He still loved them and us. He loves us. God loves the world and excludes no one. St. Augustine ties it altogether when he says, "God loves each one of us as if there was only one of us to love." How amazing. What a bite to savor!

As we take our next one, we notice that it tastes likes something else. We pick up on a new flavor. It reminds us of Genesis 22. "...He gave His only-begotten Son..." In Genesis 22, we see a father, Abraham, with his only son, Isaac. Isaac is bound, tied, and ready to be sacrificed by Abraham until the Angel of the Lord tells him, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him, for now I know that you fear God, seeing you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me."

There is a story about how the Luther family once read this text for family devotions. Luther's wife, Katie, said, "I do not believe this. God would not have treated His Son like that!" "But, Katie, He did." Luther replied.

Unlike Abraham, God gave His Son for us. He didn't withhold Him, and gave Him on our behalf. He was crucified for us. He bore the wrath that we deserved. He died the death that was supposed to be...ours, and took the punishment we earned. God gave Jesus for a world that opposed Him. He gave Jesus to a world that hated Him, and rebelled against Him. He gave Jesus to a world that didn't know, or recognize Him. Let's take another bite.

"...that whoever believes in Him should not perish...." Faith saves. However, not just any faith saves, but faith in Jesus. Faith in Jesus, the One Who is the Son of God. Faith in Jesus, the One Who has given as our sacrifice. Faith in the One Who died for us so that we could live, faith in the One Whose blood paid our ransom and set us free from the powers of sin, death, and the devil. Faith in *this One* saves. We can be certain of that because it is based on Jesus, and His work. We don't have to doubt, worry, or add anything to it. It is complete and finished. We will not perish, be separated from Him. Remember, God is the subject and source of salvation.

Let's take our last bite. "...have eternal life...." What a bite. Did you catch something significant here? It is the verb, it is present! We enjoy life with Jesus, *now*. we already have eternal life. We enjoy the life in and with Jesus now that shall never end, but consists of joy and bliss throughout countless ages. We enjoy life with Jesus now, but after death, we will enjoy life in full glory.

John 3:16 is one of the Bible's most important, and beautiful passage, and you can see why. It is the entire Gospel message simply and eloquently in one sentence. "For God so love the world that He gave His only-begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life."
