


Epistle

Sermon

In 2019, the Kooi family was going home to North St. Paul after celebrating Thanksgiving in Illinois. Just a little outside of Menomonie, I lost control of the car on some black ice, and the car swerved into another one, and then slid backwards on I-94 for a few hundred feet. I remember the event in slow motion: the cars zoomed past and around, and I remember thinking that I'm going to see the car that clobbers my family, and me. By the grace of God, we weren't hit head on, and I got the car to the side of the road. In the next few moments, my body filled with tension, the adrenaline went into overdrive, the fear from the moment sunk in, and I also had a sense of awe in that my family and I weren't seriously hurt, or killed. It was one of the scariest moments in my entire life.

Have you ever had a moment like that? Maybe as a child, you almost drowned. It could have happened as an adult when a simple household repair gone wrong almost gave you a serious injury. Perhaps, it was a moment like mine, when you were in a car accident. Those fearful moments never leave us, do they?

The disciples had a similar, fearful encounter one evening that they never forgot. One night on the lake, a storm hits, and fear sets in, and understandably, so. However, did you catch when Mark said their fear was the greatest? No looking in the bulletin. When do you think their fear was its peak? Was it when the storm clouds brewed and the rains began? Was it when the waves rocked the boat and the disciples lost control? Was it when the water flowed in the boat, or when they noticed Jesus was sleeping? Was it when the rain stopped, the waves calmed down, and their was peace on the lake? Think about it for a moment. The answer is counterintuitive. Their fear was greatest after the storm was calmed. That was when things got scary. It was after seeing Jesus do what only God could do, calm a storm, that Mark says they "feared a great fear." Who would have thought that Jesus was scarier than the storm! This morning, we will focus on fear. What does the fear of the disciples teach us about fear? What do you fear? The Gospel text invites us to reflect on the things that cause us to be afraid, which can be many. There are silly fears, like fear of the color yellow, fear of cheese, clowns, belly buttons, and beards. There are what I call the "classics," fears of heights, flying, small spaces, spiders, snakes, or bugs. There are some more serious, and debilitating fears, too, aren't there? There are fears of failure: maybe it is a fear of public speaking, not getting accepted to a school, or underperforming at work. In this sphere of fear is also a fear of failure in our vocations, whether that is as a parent, spouse, child, or employee. And despite God's abundant provision, we can also suffer from financial fears. Maybe you have a fear that you won't have enough money to retire, or that medical bills will overwhelm and bury you. It could be the fear of taking on more debt through a loan, or making ends meet with rising prices and economic uncertainty. Markets love stability, and our current world is anything but stable. Other fears can be more social, or of a personal nature. Do you have a fear of being alone, losing face, being rejected, or being unloved? There is, of course, FOMO: Fear Of Missing Out. What might you be missing out on?

We can have fears for others, too, can't we? I have been told that no matter the age, you will always worry for your children. It could be that they won't turn out right, marry a bad spouse, or cannot provide for themselves. It might be a fear that our parents are failing, or a spouse's health is fading. There can also be the fear of the future. Perhaps the three most terrifying letters in the English language can be N-E-W...new. This isn't even mentioning spiritual fears, like wondering if our sin is forgiven, or will stay forgiven, or if God has abandoned you. What fears do you have? I hope I haven't mentioned too many! What strikes at your heart, and drops your stomach?

These are real fears, aren't they? They are things we are concerned about. These are things we take seriously. These are things that can keep us up at night, torture our stomachs, and make our joy seem like a desert plain. As we look at the disciples and their experience that evening, this thought keeps popping up. I want you to consider it with me. Are we afraid of the wrong things?

The disciples' fear that night was entirely legitimate. Have you ever been out on a lake at night? It can be a scary thing. I remember seeing some summer fireworks on the Chain-O-Lakes, which is a series of connected lakes, rivers, and streams in Illinois on my father-in-law's boat. After the fireworks were over, it was night, and we had to begin our trek back to his house, and I remember it being a scary thing. As an experienced boater, even he was fearful of driving at night, and for good reason. You cannot easily see piers, others boats, bridge poles, or other hidden dangers. On our way back, I remember seeing a boat stuck on a rocky shallow part. They misread the buoys, and went right into the shallow, rocky water, and cracked their hull, and beached their boat. Bodies of water are even more dangerous at night.

Have you ever been out on a lake at night? Have you ever been out on a lake at night in a boat with no power: no motor, no lights, no radio, and no cell phone? Have you ever been on a lake at night in a boat with hurricane-strength winds crashing against you, and the boat filling with water? That was how the disciples found themselves that evening. Their fear was legitimate. As experienced fishermen, they knew things weren't good. The storm was raging, water was pouring in, Jesus was sleeping, and the end seemed nigh. If there was ever a time for fear, this would be it!

But, Jesus rebukes them. "Why are you so afraid?" He asks. Then He says the stinging question: "Have you still no faith?" Jesus doesn't say it here, but His words from Matthew 10:38 come to mind: "Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul. Rather, fear Him Who can destroy both soul and body in hell." The storm was scary, but the worst that it could do was to end their lives. Financial trouble is scary. Family problems are scary. Heights and snakes and chemo and legal trouble and addiction and loneliness are all legitimately scary. But, there is something much more worthy of fear than these: Jesus.

Mark says, "And Jesus awoke and rebuked the wind and said to the sea, 'Peace! Be still!' And the wind ceased, and there was a great calm. He said to them, 'Why are you so afraid? Have you still no faith?' And they were filled with great fear and said to one another, 'Who then is this, that even the wind and the sea obey Him?'" In the whole event, they interestingly feared Jesus *more*, and you can see why. In the Small Catechism, fearing God is defined as taking God seriously as Creator and Judge.

In that moment, they took Him seriously as Creator. They stood face to face with the God Who made the Universe, the One Who laid the earth's foundations and gave the sea its limits. They stood before the One Who knows all things, and Who has power over all things, and instantly stopped a storm with two little Greek words. It is this One they just insulted by saying, "**Don't you care that we are perishing?**" We have said that, haven't we? We understand their fear.

In that moment, they also fear Him as Judge. Encounters with God in Scripture rightly terrified people. When Moses was on Mount Sinai, he said, "I am trembling with fear". When Uzzah stopped the ark of the covenant from falling when it was being transported, God struck him dead. David was upset by that, 1 Chronicles reports: "And David was afraid of God that day, and he said, 'How can I bring the ark of God home to me?" When Isaiah sees God on the throne, he cries, "Woe is me! For I am lost!" We see this with Job, too. When God is finally done questioning Job three chapters later, he says, "I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you; therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes." Their fear is understandable. We understand that fear, don't we? We are sinful, too, and could never stand before God on our own.

Remember our initial observation and question: "Do we fear the wrong things?" I think we do. Jesus is the One Who is truly worthy of fear. He is the One we are to take seriously, but what do we do? Do we live our lives in fear? Let's look at the disciples' initial question. In the boat, they asked, "**Do you not care that we are perishing?**" It certainly was a legitimate question. The boat was filling with water and Jesus is...sleeping. But, Jesus' answer is legitimate, too. He doesn't answer through words, but through deeds. He stood and rebuked the storm, and a great calm came. His answer couldn't be clearer:

He certainly cared. The only one Who is truly worthy of fear shows He cares for His disciples and that He desires to save them. He wants to save not just them, but *all who are perishing*. We don't need to fear the wrong things. There is plenty in this world that can and will hurt us. Such things cause legitimate concern and push us to seek help. However, when they are compared to the One Who reigns over all creation, they are entirely unworthy of our fear. Why? It is because the only One truly worthy fearing has shown He is willing and able to save us from perishing! He shows it to the disciples in the text, and He shows it to us all in His resurrection from the dead. He is reign is absolute, and He reigns over death, the devil, the world, and the forces of nature. He cares for us in both body and soul. He forgives us when we doubt Him and His care, question His goodness, and when we go astray. Jesus died to remove the fear we would have to stand before God, and because of Jesus, we can confidently stand before Him with our petitions, prayers, and please. Jesus died and rose to save those who are perishing. The One we are to fear is for us, and with us. One of my favorite authors comments on this text by saying, "This good news does not magically relieve us of the many fears and anxieties which harass so many people today...but it does provide a foundation from which to address all that makes us afraid." He is right. When faced with the classic fears of flying, snakes, bugs, you name it, the God Who is bigger and stronger than all is with us. When forgiven, and precious child. When financial fears stare us down, we look to the One Who cares for the

fears of flying, snakes, bugs, you name it, the God Who is bigger and stronger than all is with us. Whe faced with fears of failure, we find our identity grounded in the waters of baptism as God's loved, forgiven, and precious child. When financial fears stare us down, we look to the One Who cares for th sparrows, knows our needs, and faithfully gives us our daily bread. We approach it one day at a time with the One Who daily provides for our needs. When social fears strike at our heart, we look to the communion of saints, and the fullness of a life lived with God as His child. When our minds are burdened with fears for others, we commit our loved ones to hands greater than ours, and to the One Who can do more for them than we ever could. We bring our fears to the One Who has all authority, and Who loves us with an everlasting love. The One Who is truly worthy of fear cares for you. IN JESUS' NAME, amen.
