

Sermon "Shepherd(s) and Sheep" Jeremiah 23:1-6

What creature are we most like? In the nineteenth century, Charles Darwin claimed that people are most like monkeys. That was wrong then, it is wrong today. Today, many biologists now say that people are most like rats. Why? Whatever makes a rat sick tends to make us sick. Isn't that a happy thought? We are like rats? Other scientists believe people are a lot like bees because we're social creatures who live in highly structured societies. Still, others compare us to dolphins because dolphins and people have a similar ratio of brain-mass to body-size. Monkeys, rats, bees, and dolphins. According to the Bible, what creature are we most like? I bet you know. Sheep! Sheep are mentioned over 500 times in the Bible-more than any other animal. (This morning, we will look at shepherds and sheep). Sheep need a shepherd, especially, when they have been hurt deeply. In our Old Testament text, Jeremiah says the sheep have been hurt greatly.

In the opening verses, we hear, "Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of my pasture!" declares the LORD. Therefore thus says the LORD, the God of Israel, concerning the shepherds who care for my people: 'You have scattered my flock and have driven them away, and you have not attended to them. Behold, I will attend to you for your evil deeds, declares the LORD." God says the sheep are hurt and scattered. Who is the culprit? The shepherds! Who are the shepherds?

In the book of Jeremiah, the shepherds are the leaders and rulers of the people. In the prior chapter, 22, Jeremiah gave three examples of bad shepherds, the last three kings of Judah. There were Jehoahaz, Jehoiakim, and Jehoiachin. God says the leaders of the people, the kings especially, haven't cared for the people. They didn't protect and watch out for them. They didn't do justice and righteousness. They misled the people, and because of that misleading, the sheep are scattered to other countries in exile. The shepherds failed in their duties. They were bad, and they were bad at what they did. The people who were to be the greatest blessing, and who were to exercise love and care, the shepherds, ended up doing the most damage and destruction to the sheep, the people.

There are times when authorities hurt us and do great damage. Called to extend justice and compassion, instead leaders might use their position to bring us great harm. They can act violently and irrationally. They can act carelessly and selfishly. What was it for you? Was it a boss or employer? A parent? A teacher? A coach? A professor? A mentor? For Howard Rutledge, it was a foreign government.

Howard Rutledge was an American fighter pilot during the Vietnam War who was shot down and captured by the North Vietnamese in 1965. They locked up Rutledge up in a prison in Hanoi, North Vietnam. What was the prison called? *Heartbreak Hotel*. There, Rutledge was locked in a 6 x 6 cell. There were no books, no magazines, and no newspapers. The colors were drab gray and dirt brown. He fought to keep his sanity. He was eventually released eight years later. Sometimes, life gets dark, really dark, when those in power choose to harm us and hurt us. After all, we're just sheep.

Sheep are defenseless. Sheep can't see very far, less than 15 yards (they can't see the back of the church from where I'm standing). They don't know what hits them until it hits them. They have no natural defense defenses, no claws, horns, or fangs. To make matters worse, they are top-heavy. Their legs are thin and wobbly. They are prime targets for hungry wolves.

Sheep are distracted. Sheep are distracted by nasal flies, bot flies, and warble flies. When tormented by these pests, it is impossible for sheep to lie down and rest. They get up on their feet, stamp their legs, and shake their heads. Poor sheep can become so distracted that even a jackrabbit suddenly popping from a behind a bush can cause an entire flock to freak out and begin a stampede. This leads to the next point: sheep aren't that bright.

Shepherds tell stories about how one sheep falls off a cliff and the rest of the flock follows that one over the edge! In 2005, Turkish shepherds watched in horror as hundreds of sheep followed each other over a massive cliff. More than 400 sheep died, but their bodies cushioned the fall of the additional 1,100 sheep that followed them.

Isn't this us? Defenseless, distracted, and dumb? We are sheep who wander from the Shepherd and His fold where we are safe, secure, and fed. We are sheep who truly are defenseless. We are vulnerable, and we are dependent on God for all that we have and for who we are. We are sheep that are distracted and dumb: we continually fall prey and are distracted by what enslaves, kills, deceives, and destroys us. We unwittingly go from one spiritual danger to the next. Sheep need a shepherd, don't they? Fortunately, God knows that.

Through the prophet Jeremiah, God says that He will gather His flock again. He will restore His people, and He will bring them home. He will undo the curse, and see that they are cared for, attended to, and no longer missing. God promises, "Then I will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the countries where I have driven them, and I will bring the back to their fold, and they shall be fruitful and multiply. I will set shepherds over them who will care for them, and they shall fear no more, nor be dismayed, neither shall any be missing, declares the LORD. What a promise by God! The people will have a shepherd again.

Jesus is the embodiment of this very promise. Our Gospel text shows this well. In verse 34, we hear, "When Jesus went ashore, He saw a great crowd, and He had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd." You aren't shepherdless! Jesus knows you need a shepherd. Jesus sees your pain and hurt. Jesus knows your needs and sin. Jesus cares for you, both in body, and in soul. He provides all that we need to support our bodies and lives. Jesus, our Shepherd, distills all fear. Psalm 23 proclaims: "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me." We aren't defenseless or alone: the Shepherd walks with us. If we can't see Him when we suffer sadness, His promised presence prevails for us through baptism. If we feel that He is too far away when our heart is broken, He invites us to His supper, saying, "Take, eat, this is my body. Take, drink, this is my blood." When we lament with Jeremiah, "I sat alone", Jesus is our constant companion. Jesus our Shepherd searches for, and gathers those who are His own. He seeks us when we wander, calling us back through His Word. He calls us when we get distracted, and breaks sin's deadly hold on our lives.

But God isn't done promising things, yet. The prophet continues with a prophecy about Jesus, calling Him a name that is the Bible summed up in five simple words. The last king before the exile was a man called Zedekiah, which means, "My righteousness is the Lord." The name of this promised Shepherd King is "The LORD is our righteousness." Isn't that name the summary of Scripture? Isn't that what it is about? The Bible is about how God sent His Son into our flesh to take on our sin, be our Savior, and to give us the righteousness that we could never hope to earn. Unlike Zedekiah, this King will live up to His name. Zedekiah might have had the name, but Jesus gives the gift: the gift of righteousness. Righteousness is His essence, His being, and His nature. God gives by faith what the shepherds and sheep of Judah lacked: righteousness. He gives us by faith what we utterly lack: righteousness, so we can be right with God and live before Him. This righteousness that God imputes gives us hope: hope for the future, hope for the new creation, and hope for life as a sheep.

Our sermon hymn captures this well in stanzas one and two: "Jesus, Thy blood and righteousness/ My beauty are, my glorious dress/ Midst flaming worlds, in these arrayed/ With joy shall I lift up my head....Bold shall I stand in that great day/ Cleansed and redeemed, no debt to pay/Fully absolved through these I am/ From sin and fear, from guilt and shame." This hope encompasses our entire lives: The LORD is our righteousness.

What creature are we most like? Monkeys? Rats? Bees? Dolphins? Sheep. We are sheep, and that is great thing when you have a Shepherd King like Jesus. In His Name, AMEN.




Distribution




