


Apostles' Creed

Sermon

5

First words are exciting and memorable, aren't they? It can be the first words of a child. I remember where my daughter was when she spoke for the first time, and it wasn't the word "Daddy." It can be a new player's first press conference with his new team: "I came to Minnesota to win, and I believe in the team here." It can be a politician announcing a campaign. Remember Amy Klobuchar's presidential announcement in a snowstorm a few years ago? It went viral. First words are special moments. They are a time of anticipation and excitement (what will be said?). They can set the tone. They can show what a person is about, and what is important to them.

In Luke 2, we find Jesus speaking for the first time in the Gospel. We see His first words. In Matthew, they were, "Let it be so now, for thus it is fitting to fulfill all righteousness." In Mark, the first words are utters are, "The time if fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the Gospel." In John, they are short and concise, and even echo what Jesus says in Luke. "What are you seeking?" In Luke, Jesus proclaims a double question: "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" Jesus' first words show us Who He is and what He is about. Today, we will look at His first words from Luke.

"Why were you looking for me?" Luke tells us that Jesus' family had the yearly tradition of going up to Jerusalem every year to celebrate the Passover. The Passover celebrated God's greatest act of salvation in the Old Testament, the Exodus from Egypt. The festival would feature a lamb that would be slain, and an interactive meal that would be done with the family. It is like our Christmas, or Easter, festivals that celebrate an act of God's salvation, and that often features a family meal. After the feast was ended, the family returned home, but Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem. His family did not know it. They thought he was with the group. After a day of travel, they realize that Jesus is not with them, and the panic sets in. They search high and low for Him, but to no avail. After three, long, panic-driven and stress-soaked days, they find Jesus in the

temple. He is sitting among the teachers, listening, and asking them questions. Those who heard Jesus were amazed at His understanding and answers; His parents were astonished, too. When Mary finds Him, she understandably says, "Son, why have you treated us so? Behold, Your father and I have been searching for you in great distress."

And Jesus answers her question, with a question. It is a gentle rebuke with a touch of surprise. "Why were you looking for me?" Given His identity as the Son of God, why wouldn't He be here? Why is she so surprised? Mary and Joseph don't quite understand. In fact, no one in Jesus' life will, or does, understand. Many people will seek Him and seek to understand Him in His life, but no one will truly understand Him until after His resurrection.

"Why were you looking for me?" It is a question not just for Mary, but for us, too. It is a question for every reader and hearer of Luke's Gospel. It is as if Jesus steps out of the page, or the story stops, and He turns to ask you. "Why were you looking for me?" How would you answer that question? Be honest about it. Be truthful. Don't answer with what you think you should, but rather, what is the first thing that comes to your mind, and heart?

Solomon was asked that once, in a sense. In a dream, God appears to him, and says, "Ask what I shall give you." And the young king says, "Give you servant therefore an understanding mind to govern your people, that I may discern between good and evil, for who is able to govern this your great people?" The young king asks for wisdom, which in its proper sense, is a right understanding and application of the Gospel. Solomon's answer pleased God, and He granted not just wisdom, but that which he didn't ask: riches, honor, and life.

What do we seek foremost from our Lord? Things like healing, family, money/provision, safety, and homes are important, and needed, but they aren't *the foremost that we should seek*. Jesus knows and captures the dilemma we can find ourselves in with this word of encouragement in Luke 12:29-32. "And do not seek what you are to eat and what you are to drink, nor be worried. For all the nations of the world seek after these things, and your Father knows that you need them. Instead, seek His kingdom, and these things will be added to you. Fear not, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom." Our Lord knows our needs better than we do, and will provide in the way He feels best. He has welcomed and brought us into His kingdom, and taken care of our greatest need, our sin. He will take care of the rest. "Why were you looking for me?"

Jesus continues. "Did you not know that I must....", or, "Did you not know it is necessary...." Jesus uses a passion word, here. It is *dei*, which means, "must," "it is necessary." It is a word of destiny. Think of someone like Harry Potter, or Luke Skywalker (people with a destiny to face that their life culminates towards). The word is used to denote the necessity of God's plan of salvation. Jesus uses it to proclaim His appointed and undertaken course; His destiny. "It is necessary." "I must" What is part of God's plan of salvation in Luke?

In 4:43, Jesus says, "And to the other cities it is necessary for me to proclaim the good news of the kingdom of God, because on account of this I was sent." God wants His gospel proclaimed! In 9:22, Jesus says, "It is necessary for the Son of Man to suffer many things and to be rejected from the elders and chief priests and scribes and to be killed and on the third day be raised." It is necessary that Jesus die for us. In 13:33, Jesus says, "However, it is necessary for me today and tomorrow and the one coming to go, because it is not possible for a prophet to be killed outside Jerusalem." He is to die in Jerusalem, the place where a prophet is to die. The real Passover Lamb will be slain there. To His disciples on Easter evening, Jesus says in 24:44, "These are my words which I spoke openly to you while yet I was with you, that it is necessary for all the Scriptures to be fulfilled in the law of Moses, and the prophets, and the psalms concerning me." Scripture cannot be broken, and God keeps His word. "I must." "It is necessary." This shows what Jesus is about, and what is important to Him: you, you and your salvation. This ties into what He says next.

"Did you not know it is necessary for me to be about my Father's business?" This is why Jesus was sent, and what He is engrossed in: His Father's business. And what His Father's business? Our salvation! Paul the Apostle shows it well in our Epistle reading. He shows what God has done for us. Paul pens, "**He chose us in Him [Christ] before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before Him**" God chose you. He picked you out. He selected you. He set you aside for Himself. He did it before the creation of the world. This was all intentional and part of the plan. It was not your own doing or influenced by

you. It is not based on anything in you that you could lose or live up to. You don't have to justify His decision, earn it, or pay Him back. What's more is that then in God's eyes, through Jesus, He sees you as holy and blameless before Him. God choose you. He redeemed you, too, through Jesus.

"In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of trespasses, according to the riches of His grace which He lavished upon us, in all wisdom and insight". Do you know what the word *lavish* means? It means to "bestow something in generous or extravagant quantities on". God lavishes the riches of His grace upon us. He lavishes that redemption, that forgiveness. He isn't stingy, but is generous. This is His business!

And He has sealed us. In the ancient world, everyone had their own unique seal. It was like a social security number. It was unique and your own. These seals could be wax ones. For animals, they could be a brand. For soldiers and slaves, it could be a tattoo. In the ancient world, seals showed ownership. Paul says that God has placed His seal on you! He has placed His name on you! When and where did that happen? God placed His name, His seal on us, in baptism, as a pastor poured water on our heads and said, "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." From that moment on, we belonged to Him!

And not only has our God sealed us in baptism, He has given us His Holy Spirit in baptism, too, Who is the down payment for that inheritance that we so long for. The gift of the Holy Spirit says there is more coming! The best is yet to come! He is the guarantee, for He sustains and makes us faithful until the end. God has chosen us, redeemed us, and sealed us. This is His salvation. This is His business. This is what He is all about! "Did you not know it is necessary for me to be about my Father's business?"

Jesus' first words in Luke show us what Jesus is all about, what is important to Him: You. You, and your salvation. That is His Father's business.


The Words of Our Lord




