First Reading Acts 9:1–22

But Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any belonging to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he went on his way, he approached Damascus, and suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. And falling to the ground he heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?" And he said, "Who are you, Lord?" And he said, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But rise and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do." The men who were traveling with him stood speechless, hearing the voice but seeing no one. Saul rose from the ground, and although his eyes were opened, he saw nothing. So they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. And for three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank. Now there was a disciple at Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, "Ananias." And he said, "Here I am, Lord." And the Lord said to him, "Rise and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul, for behold, he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight." But Ananias answered, "Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints at Jerusalem. And here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who call on your name." But the Lord said to him, "Go, for he is a chosen instrument of mine to carry my name before the Gentiles and kings and the children of Israel. For I will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name." So Ananias departed and entered the house. And laying his hands on him he said, "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus who appeared to you on the road by which you came has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and he regained his sight. Then he rose and was baptized; and taking food, he was strengthened. For some days he was with the disciples at Damascus. And immediately he proclaimed Jesus in the synagogues, saying, "He is the Son of God." And all who heard him were amazed and said, "Is not this the man who made havoc in Jerusalem of those who called upon this name? And has he not come here for this purpose, to bring them bound before the chief priests?" But Saul increased all the more in strength, and confounded the Jews who lived in Damascus by proving that Jesus was the Christ.

Holy Gospel John 21:1–19

P The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the twenty-first chapter.

C Glory to You, O Lord.

After this Jesus revealed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias, and he revealed himself in this way. Simon Peter, Thomas (called the Twin), Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples were together. Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We will go with you." They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing. Just as day was breaking, Jesus stood on the shore; yet the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, "Children, do you have any fish?" They answered him, "No." He said to them, "Cast the net on the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in, because of the quantity of fish. That disciple whom Jesus loved therefore said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on his outer garment, for he was stripped for work, and threw himself into the sea. The other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, but about a hundred yards off. When they got out on land, they saw a charcoal fire in place, with fish laid out on it, and bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, 153 of them. And although there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them,

"Come and have breakfast." Now none of the disciples dared ask him, "Who are you?" They knew it was the Lord. Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and so with the fish. This was now the third time that Jesus was revealed to the disciples after he was raised from the dead. When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." He said to him, "Feed my lambs." He said to him a second time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." He said to him, "Tend my sheep." He said to him the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter was grieved because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" and he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. Truly, truly, I say to you, when you were young, you used to dress yourself and walk wherever you wanted, but when you are old, you will stretch out your hands, and another will dress you and carry you where you do not want to go." (This he said to show by what kind of death he was to glorify God.) And after saying this he said to him, "Follow me."

Sermon "God's Three R's to Recycling" Acts 9:1-19 and John 21:1-19

Do you remember the 3 R's to recycling? Can you recall what they are? They are reduce...reuse...and recycle. Reduce what you use, reuse it when you can, and then, recycle it. Mr. Heid, a chemistry teacher I had in High School, had his own take on what to do with what can't be used anymore, what shouldn't be used, what is broken, or garbage. His was reduce...reuse...and reuse. He didn't believe in recycling, perse, because he was concerned that the time and energy used to recycle would be counterproductive. And so, he didn't have a recycling bin, and would make us reuse old, used paper, and graded assignments. Mr. Heid isn't the only one with his own theory on recycling, though. God has his own theory, too. God has His own practice for what to do with people who are disqualified, defeated, destroyed, and broken. He has his own practice for what to do with people who are deserve, and should be discarded, cast aside, and thrown away. His theory and practice is seen in Saul and Simon. We know them better as Paul and Peter.

Have you ever said, "I thought you wanted me to do that?" "I thought I was pleasing you. I had no idea." "I thought I was doing good." Have you ever tried to help someone, but ended up doing the wrong thing, and made it worse? Maybe you purchased the wrong ingredient, returned the wrong item, or messed up the measurement. Have you misread a situation, or misunderstood a request? In Acts 9, Paul knows. He says just that. "I thought I was pleasing you. I thought I was doing good."

In verse one, Luke introduces us to Paul: "But Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord...." Saul is portrayed as a wild, and murderous man, isn't he? He is intoxicated with hatred and rage against the Christians. He has the feel of being volatile, unsettled, and aggressive. He is zealously persecuting, hunting, and killing Christians for God. Paul thinks he is doing "good" by stomping out this heretical movement for Him. He also thinks He is "good" before Him, being righteous and blameless as a Pharisee.

As he is on his way to Damascus to hunt and persecute more Christians, he meets Jesus. A sudden light from heaven flashes around him, blinds him, and a voice says, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?" He asks, "Who are you, Lord?" "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting." Could you imagine the horror? Paul thought he was serving God by persecuting them, but instead was doing evil against Him! What Paul thought was good, was, infact, evil. He is then told to go to Damascus, and to wait, there, for more instructions.

Meanwhile, God gives a vision to Ananias, a man whom God will use to heal Paul and help bring him to faith. However, Ananias is hesitant to be that instrument. "Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem. (And here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who call on your name.)" In other words, why would you want to use him? Look at him! He kills your people and is ready to kill more! He is evil, violent, and a brutal thug. If I heal him, I would be doing *You* a disservice. Let him remain blind. He has what is coming to him." Ananias has a fair point. What will He do with Paul? Let's go to Peter.

Have you ever said, "Man, I have messed up big time." "I wish I could redo that." "If I had a chance, I would do things differently." Ever said that raising kids? Ever said that in marriage, or an old friendship? Ever said that after letting the tongue let loose, or letting that anger blaze? Ever said that after having the opportunity to help someone, and said, "No," because of selfish reasons? Have past actions, or a lifestyle, forever tainted your Christian image in the sight of family, friends, neighbors, or co-workers? Did you do that thing you never said you would do? In John 21, Peter knows. He says these things. "I wish I could redo that. If I had a chance, I would do things differently."

In John 21, the Apostle reintroduces us to Peter, who has returned to his old way of life as a fisherman. He is fishing with his friends, and has a catch less night. As they sit on the still water, a voice cries out from the shore, asking if they have any fish. It suggests to throw the net on the other side of the boat. As they do, a miraculous catch unfolds, and John realizes it is Christ the Risen Lord. Christ is Risen! He is Risen Indeed, Alleluia! Peter then jumps into the water, and the rest bring the catch to shore. When they arrive, they find breakfast is ready, and eat it with the Risen Lord. Once they are done, Peter and Jesus go on a walk, and a conversation takes place.

Peter is asked: "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" It is a good question to ask him. Does Peter love Jesus more than the other disciples? Peter swore an allegiance to Jesus that was bigger than life itself. He boasted a love so deep that even if everyone else was to leave Him for dead, He wouldn't. But, he failed. He did what He said he wouldn't do. He left Jesus for dead. He abandoned Him at

His greatest hour of need, and broke His word. He was a coward and mess-up; he wasn't a leader, but a loser. He disgraced and disqualified himself. Let him fish. What will He do with Peter?

And what will He do with you? We, who have messed-up big time. We, who, if we could, would have acted differently toward our family, friends, neighbor, and Lord. We, who wished we could have held that tongue, tempered that rage, or have realized that what we were doing was *evil instead of good*. We, who have sinned again and again in thought, word, and deed. What does God do with mess-ups, mistakes, failures, and people who *should be discarded*? Let's go back to the philosophies of recycling. Does He reduce, reuse, and recycle? No. Does He reduce, reuse, and reuse...kind of; getting warmer. God does His own thing. His theory is different. He *reclaims*, *restores*, *and reuses*.

God reclaims us as His own as He calls us by name. He doesn't leave us on the garbage heap, or recycling bin, to be carted away. No, He reclaims and calls to Himself those that are His. To the violent and persecuting man on his way to Damascus, He calls out, "Saul, Saul." To the purposeless and failed fisherman, He says, "Simon, son of John...Simon, son of John." He uses their personal names! He calls by name! Isaiah 43:1: "Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine." We aren't Satan's. We aren't sin's. We aren't death's, and we don't belong to what we might find ourselves trapped in, or enslaved to. We aren't prisoners of our past or hostages to our present. We are His-purchased and won through the blood of Christ, and called by the Spirit through water and the Word. We are *reclaimed* as His.

He restores. When we went on vicarage, we received a furnished apartment, and so we left a lot of our stuff back in a storage unit in Fort Wayne. Unbeknownst to us, our unit flooded, and a lot of our stuff got moldy, damaged, and ruined. Initially, I thought it was white dust, but when I brought things home and saw it in the light, a lot of it had to be discarded. So, I set a lot of it by the curb for the garbage man to take. I was amazed how much of it people took, even with a sign saying that they were moldy! I was also amazed how much I later saw on other's curbs. Anyone can pick-up discarded things, but not everyone restores them, or can. But God can, and does.

God doesn't leave us broken, discarded, or stuck in the mire of our sin, past, and failures. He restores us. He showers His grace and forgiveness on His people. Saul is called "brother" by Ananias, which is a term of forgiveness and fellowship. His guilt is erased, and he is welcomed into the communion of saints. Peter is reinstated as an Apostle and called to feed, lead, and guide God's people once again despite his huge failure. God shows His steadfast love and mercy to us, which is what our broken and splintered lives need.

He restores our broken fellowship with Him, and others, by the forgiveness He has won through His Son. He restores our bleak future, hell, and replaces it with Heaven. He restores our splintered lives as He gives us His care, hope, strength, and grace, as we deal with the daily grind of life in a fallen world. He restores and renews us fallen creatures, making us in the image of His Son. He transforms our hearts, actions, thoughts, and words by His Holy Spirit. I daily pray for Him to give me "open eyes, an open heart, and open hands." Open eyes to see the needs of my family, neighbors, and the opportunities He puts before me. An open heart to respond in love, selflessness, and generosity. Open hands to be ready to serve. He daily renews in baptism, where He daily puts to death the old nature, and the new one arises to live before Him in righteousness and purity forever.

And He reuses. God's not done. He wasn't with Paul. Paul became God's "chosen instrument" to bring His name to the Gentiles, and became, arguably, the greatest missionary of all-time! He wasn't done with Peter. He called him to serve His people once again, and Peter is the one who started the Gentile mission. You wouldn't be sitting here, today, if it wasn't for him! And He isn't done with you, and me, either.

God uses our words, actions, and deeds to lead others to His Son. Have you ever heard of St. Monica? Margarethe Lindemann? Jeanne Le Franc? Susanna Annesley? Johanna Zschenderlein? Morrow Coffey? You might not know their names, but they did a great service to the world. You probably don't know them, but you do know their sons: St. Augustine, Martin Luther, John Calvin, Charles Wesley, C. F. W. Walther, and Billy Graham.

Could you imagine a world without their mother's influence? Could you imagine a world without them being faithful Christian mothers who prayed for them, who brought them to Church, even when they got nothing out of the service, themselves, and who taught them the faith? Who says that one witness or example, isn't important? Who says one person being reached, isn't? It couldn't be farther from the truth! Imagine if

they kept their mouths shut! Our Christian witness isn't *insignificant*. Who knows what God will do with it, or with who, or when. That witness can even shine on when we are on gone from this world!

And so, what is God's theory for recycling? He reclaims, restores, and reuses. Just ask Paul and Peter.




The Words of Our Lord




