LIGHTING OF THE ADVENT WREATH Week 1: Coming Today, the season of Advent begins, and the church tracks the time until Christmas with the lighting of the Advent wreath. The word *Advent* appropriately means *coming*, and that is what the season celebrates. It celebrates the coming of Christ in various ways. Each week, we will focus on a different aspect of Christ's coming, or of the season, as we light a candle on the Advent wreath.

To aid in our meditation, the hymn *O Lord, How Shall I Meet You* will be used. It is written by Lutheran Pastor Paul Gerhardt (1607-1676), who is often said to be Germany's best hymn writer. His famous hymn captures the first coming of Christ, along with the anticipation of His second coming. We live in this tension. Our Lord has come, but He is coming again!

Our readings reflect the tension this morning. In our Old Testament reading, we see how God will gather the nations to His Church, the latter day Zion, through His Word. In the Epistle reading, we hear Paul capture this tension by saying, "For salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed." And in the Gospel reading, we see our Lord triumphantly enter Jerusalem. However, this entry will be nothing compared to when He comes again in power and glory at the Last Day. The season's color of blue also helps to teach this point, too. Blue is a color of royalty. Our King is coming!

As the first candle is lit to remind us how Jesus has come and will come again, we sing selected verses of *O Lord, How Shall I Meet You.*

 O Lord, how shall I meet You, How welcome You aright?
 Your people long to greet You, My hope, my heart's delight!
 O kindle, Lord most holy, Your lamp within my breast
 To do in spirit lowly All that may please You best.
 Your Zion strews before You

OLD TESTAMENT READING *Isaiah* 2:1–5 (Isaiah proclaims the peaceable kingdom of God.) The word that Isaiah the son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem. It shall come to pass in the latter days that the mountain of the house of the Lord shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and shall be lifted up above the hills; and all the nations shall flow to it, and many peoples shall come, and say: "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob, that he may teach us his ways and that we may

walk in his paths." For out of Zion shall go the law, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. He shall judge between the nations, and shall decide disputes for many peoples; and they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore. O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord.

Lector: This is the Word of the Lord. **People: Thanks be to God.**

PSALM Psalm 122

Leader: I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the Lord!"
People: Our feet have been standing within your gates, O Jerusalem!
Leader: Jerusalem—built as a city that is bound firmly together, to which the tribes go up,
People: the tribes of the Lord, as was decreed for Israel, to give thanks to the name of the Lord.
Leader: There thrones for judgment were set, the thrones of the house of David.
People: Pray for the peace of Jerusalem! "May they be secure who love you!
Leader: Peace be within your walls and security within your towers!"
People: For my brothers and companions' sake I will say, "Peace be within you!"
Leader: For the sake of the house of the Lord our God, I will seek your good.

EPISTLE *Romans* 13:8–14 (Put on the Lord Jesus Christ as you await His coming.) Owe no one anything, except to love each other, for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, "You shall not commit adultery, You shall not murder, You shall not steal, You shall not covet," and any other commandment, are summed up in this word: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law. Besides this you know the time, that the hour has come for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed. The night is far gone; the day is at hand. So then let us cast off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light. Let us walk properly as in the daytime, not in orgies and drunkenness, not in sexual immorality and sensuality, not in quarreling and jealousy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Lector: This is the Word of the Lord. **People: Thanks be to God.**

HOLY GOSPEL *Matthew 21:1–11* (Jesus enters the city of Jerusalem.) Pastor: The Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew, the twenty-first chapter. **People: Glory to You, O Lord.**

Now when they drew near to Jerusalem and came to Bethphage, to the Mount of Olives, then Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village in front of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her. Untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, you shall say, 'The Lord needs them,' and he will send them at once." This took place to fulfill what was spoken by the prophet, saying, "Say to the daughter of Zion, 'Behold, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a beast of burden." The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them. They brought the donkey and the colt and put on them their cloaks, and he sat on them. Most of the crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. And the crowds that went before him and that followed him were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!" And when he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was stirred up, saying, "Who is this?" And the crowds said, "This is the prophet Jesus, from Nazareth of Galilee."

Pastor: This is the Gospel of the Lord. **People: Praise to You, O Christ.**
