





Lighting of the Advent Wreath Week 4: Here!

For this last week of Advent, we acknowledge, perhaps, the most obvious coming of Christ: His first coming in the manager. In the Old Testament reading, we hear the birth of Christ foretold. Isaiah tells us the Christ will be born of a virgin. In the Gospel reading, we see that prophecy fulfilled, as Mary is found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Advent celebrates Christ's first coming in the manger. It celebrates His coming to save us.

Advent also celebrates how He comes to us today through Word and Sacrament. Jesus is present and active in His Word that is proclaimed, read, and studied. Jesus is present in baptism, where each believer is united with Him in His death and resurrection. In baptism, we put on Christ! Jesus is also present in His supper, where He comes to us in His body and blood that bring us forgiveness, life, and salvation.

Advent celebrates His first coming in the manger, His coming at the end, and how He comes today in Word and Sacrament. We will see all these themes together as we sing our hymn.

Now the birth of Jesus Christ took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been betrothed to Joseph, before they came together she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. And her husband Joseph, being a just man and unwilling to put her to shame, resolved to divorce her quietly. But as he considered these things, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, "Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. 



BIBLE STUDY: Over the next two months, we will be taking a selective look at the Gospel of Matthew, with the hope that it leads to a beautiful crescendo for the season of Lent. From now until Ash Wednesday, we will look at the larger themes and sections of Matthew's Gospel, looking at the "introduction" (1:1-4:16), the Five Discourses (five major teaching sections, along with the "deeds" that precede them), and conclusion. The hope is that an overview of Matthew will bless your daily reading and devotion, as well as give you a greater appreciation for the book this upcoming year! A brief schedule is the following.

Week 1: The Genealogy Week 2: The Introduction (1:1-4:17) Week 3: Discourse 1 (4:17-7:29) Week 4: Discourse 2 (8:1-11:1) Week 5: Discourse 3 (11:2-13:53) Week 6: Discourse 4 (13:54-19:1) Week 7: Discourse 5 (19:2-26:1) Week 8: Conclusion (26:1-28:20)
